

Creating Our First List



he residential construction industry is thriving to say the least. Real estate is booming, and we are running short on resources to keep up with the demand.

To compile the list, *BC Homes Magazine* sought the input of industry professionals, who shared with us those who inspired them.

Our 2007 list draws attention to industry leaders who practice what they preach. They are decision makers who are not afraid to rock the boat so that changes are made for the better.

Perhaps one of the most prevalent hotbutton issues in residential construction today is affordable housing. This, of course, includes social housing but it also refers to the industry at large. Real estate prices are at an all time high and BC residents are left paying higher prices for



smaller spaces. Of course, most residents are willing to compromise in order to stay in beautiful BC. Even though many can't really afford to live here, they feel they can't afford to leave here either. 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






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Meet BC's all stars of the residential construction industry.

Hank Bangma

TRAINING THE FUTURE

Since he was 12 years old, Hank has been working in residential construction. And for the last eight years, he has been teaching a program called Residential Construction Foundations at Thompson Rivers University, in Kamloops, BC. Along with building techniques, Hank teaches the students safety on the site. For the past nine years, Hank has led the Training House Project, a partnership with CHBA Kamloops. This award-winning collaboration gives his students an opportunity to build a real home as part of their first year studies. In addition to this commitment, Hank has participated on the Residential Construction Industry Training Organization Board (RCITO) for the past year and he also sits on the Provincial Carpentry Articulation Committee (9 years; 4 years as Chair). This committee ensures students moving from one educational institution to another receive all their credits and can continue on in their apprenticeship without problem. It takes a positive attitude and great fortitude to make changes in an age old industry, and Hank exemplifies this in every way.

Michael Audain LOCAL HERO

Michael Audain is a fifth generation British Columbian and clearly shows his local pride. As Chairman of Polygon Homes Ltd., Audain and his company have built over 17,000 homes in Greater Vancouver since he founded it in 1980. He believes in the economic and cultural power of the Province, which is why he served as Chairman of the Business Council of BC, President of the Urban Development Institute and member of the Canadian Council of Chief Executives. His positive contribution to the province has awarded him the Order of British Columbia.

Larry Beasley

MAN WITH THE PLAN

Metro Vancouver is a lively, livable, metropolitan community, thanks to Larry Beasley. The "Vancouver Model" of urban planning and design, developed by Beasley, is internationally known and recognized. No doubt an expert in urban development and urban issues, his advise and expertise has been sought by world powerhouse cities in the United States, China and Australia. Brian Clewes

OPENING DOORS

It's no question that the labour skills shortage is a knot in the growth of BC's residential construction industry. That's where Brian Clewes steps in. From 2004 to 2007, Brian was the Chief Executive Officer of the Industry Training Authority (ITA), responsible for the governance, expansion and improvement of BC's industry training system. He brought over 25 years of business, human resources and senior management experience to the ITA. Brian started out as an apprentice at Chrysler UK, then moved on to positions at Syncrude Canada, TransAlta and Telus. Brian's goal at the ITA was to address the skills shortage by increasing the number

of people participating in industry training, and by improving completion rates and creating greater flexibility within the industry training system. He studied Mechanical Engineering at Coventry University and has received executive management certificates from the Richard Ivey School of Business (University of Western Ontario) and the Wharton School (University of Pennsylvania).

Rich Coleman

HOUSING MINISTER

Housing matters to Rich Coleman, BC's Minister responsible for Housing. Under his direction, since 2001, more than 13,500 units of subsidized housing have been created in BC and the provincial share of the budget for affordable housing and shelter has more than tripled to \$360 million per year. After seven years, he has changed the face of housing in BC as he introduced the new provincial housing strategy, Housing Matters BC, providing innovative housing programs for those in greatest need. Minister Coleman is committed to building the best system of affordable housing and shelter in Canada.

Gordon English

DOING IT RIGHT

Gordon English is a man who gets things done. And for that reason, he is well known and respected in the industry. As the current Past President of CHBA Victoria, Gordon has assisted with the promotion of mandatory education and training, which, he hopes, will ultimately lead into the concept of a Builders Institute. Eric Gerrits


MEANT TO MENTOR



WON'T BACK DOWN




